


Backpack Project gets boost from Soroptimist International.




Discussion Review

Flight Behaviour

Barbara Kingsolver's Flight Behavior was the group's choice for our April read. In 2004 Barbara Kingsolver moved from Tucson, where she had

lived since 1978, to southern Appalachia. The flight of the title refers not only to the arrival of hordes of butterflies, but flights of various sorts undertaken by her characters. The major underlying natural issue addressed here is global warming, how changes to the global environment can result in significant changes in peoples' lives. Monarch butterflies are gathering in rural Tennessee. When

> word of the wondrous visitation gets out, interests of all sorts try to interpret its significance and some try bending the event to their own purposes. This visitation brings scientists and media to this rural Appalachian town and some interesting interactions ensue. Though climate change is Kingsolver's message, issues of class and education also play a role.

> Next up, just in time for the California primary, is Plenty Ladylike by Senator Claire McCaskill. We'll meet at Helene Fiske's home on Tuesday June 7th at 4:30PM. Hope to see vou there!



Approval of Minutes from April 4, 2016 board meeting: Minutes were previously submitted, approved by email, & published in April newsletter.

REPORTS:

Membership: Carolyn Baker

The minutes from the April board meeting stated that only one member who joined through the Shape the Future program has renewed in past years. Carolyn Baker clarified that it is honorary members, not Shape the Future members, who tend not to renew their memberships.

Public Health Preparedness

The Mariposa Public Health Department held a meeting in the Board of Supervisors Chambers in April to discuss local impacts of climate change. Most of the attendees were from the health department along with two doctors from Yosemite and a forester. Jane MacLean attended on behalf of AAUW and submitted a written report to the board; contact the board secretary for a copy. Several AAUW members were in attendance including Gary Colliver, Karen Smith, and Margarita King. Karen Smith summarized the meeting for the board. Among the topics discussed were the zika virus, food, and air quality. A survey conducted by the CDC indicated that 3.5% of Mariposa County residents do not have running water.

Transition Meeting

Dawn, Sandi, Rebecca, and Maddie will be meeting within the next few weeks to develop a transition plan for the President role.

State Convention

Sandi, Dawn, Cindy, Maddie, and Rebecca attended the AAUW state convention over the April 15 – 17 weekend. Dawn and Sandi led 5 sessions on leadership development. A documentary "The Hunting Ground" concerning campus sexual abuse was screened. We are considering this film for a future program, possibly a high school program. Other programs focused on fair pay, specifically not using prior salary history as a basis for determining salary, seduction of our youth –sexual predators on the internet, and financial literacy. It was mentioned that AAUW has a legal advocacy fund, purpose being to challenge sexual discrimination in higher education and in the workplace.

Review Goals status

The 2015-16 Goals and Actions document which was developed at the annual



planning meeting, was circulated, discussed, and updated. To review, contact the board secretary for a copy.


