From 'Dorm Mom' Kim Monson:







August 26

It hasn't even been 100 years that women in the United States have had the right to vote!



Today, AAUW gives us access to information and allows us the opportunity to act on such topics as Congress, the judicial system, and the rights of women and girls.

The 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution (also known as the *Susan B. Anthony Amendment*) guaranteeing women the right to vote, was signed into law on August 26, 1920. It seems a long time ago now, but it was a long time in coming to fruition. Well before the Seneca Falls Convention in July 1848, women called for the right to vote. Lucretia Mott and Elizabeth Cady Stanton organized the 1848 convention to address a broad range of women's rights, both social and civil. This is

often recognized as the beginning of the campaign for women's rights in the United States.

AAUW is an organization of *today* giving us access to information and activity in Congress, the judicial system and more, regarding the rights of women and girls. As we work to Empower Women in 2016 it behooves us to recognize that we are building on a legacy bought with not only energy and commitment, but also sacrifice by women and men over many years. 
Fundraiser: Fashion Show



Corks and Forks trek to Merced's Vista Ranch and Cellars

On June 23rd, it was hot outside so we tasted wine indoors at **Vista Winery**, the one we pass on the way to Merced, just east of Arboleda Drive. We realized that Tom, our host, was someone who many of us know from the Wednesday night Mariposa Farmers Market. Tom offered not only white and red wines to taste, but also friendly chatter about farming in the San Joaquin Valley and the nature of wines from the valley. According to Tom, wines from the Valley turn out to be "lighter" due to the

heat as contrasted with wines from Napa and environs where the growing season is not so hot and nights are cooler. The wines on the menu ranged from Pinot Grigio and Chardonnay, both fermented and celled in stainless steel, to several reds and a sparkling white. Responses to the Chardonnay without oak varied. The winery bottles its wines under several labels: *Highway 140*, *Vista Cellars*, and *De Jager*.

We took advantage of the opportunity of being together to get to know each other better and to bring us up to date on our lives outside AAUW.







After enjoying two years of “protected status” in the Book Group because I was doing other things for the Branch, the job of leading the book discussion finally rolled around to me. I couldn’t have gotten a better book for my initiation. Not because it was so good, but because it was so bad.

Whiplash, by Catherine Coulter, is the fourteenth book in her popular series of “romantic paranormal FBI thrillers.” The plot revolved around two separate mysteries: the possible haunting of a US senator by his dead wife and the murder of a pharmaceutical executive whose company was illegally and unethically withholding production of an affordable cancer-fighting drug. The investigation was conducted by a married team of FBI agents with implausible names like Lacey Sherlock. For romantic interest, a “guest” agent was brought in who inappropriately involved his daughter’s ballet teacher (who, of course, just happened to moonlight as a private investigator). By the final chapter, the book was littered with eight bodies, one ghost, three love-struck agents, one clueless ballet

teacher, and lots of unanswered questions. We framed our discussion around whether or not we’d recommend this as a “plane book.” The consensus was NO, although it might help put you to sleep on a long flight. The characters were one-dimensional, the dialogue was ridiculous, the story was riddled with implausible, if not downright impossible, circumstances and coincidences and the author disappointingly failed to chew on the topic of big pharma’s ethical role in health care.

The only good thing this book provided was a lot of laughter, followed by a wonderful BBQ hosted by Saralynn and Don. Many thanks to them.
