Ideas abound, setting stage for coming year

The July Leadership Team Planning Session, coupled with a full branch Brainstorming Session that was both enlightening and motivating (hello Passion Projects!), really set the stage for a tremendous 2017-2018! The Brainstorming Session began with large poster sheets

applied to the walls around the JCF Board Room. Attendees suggested the following topics for discuss. Each topic header was written on a sheet and attendees took turns taking notes and discussing their thoughts about said topics. Here are the summaries of the notes from the poster sheets.

Brainstorming Session:

Changing membership calls for more mission based programs.

The board can recommend that programs have a mission-based approach. Panel movie screenings have been highly successful in the past. "Barriers to education for young women" such as **feminine health** was one idea that was presented. Community partnerships could be beneficial, as was done with film screenings in the past. A few groups to coordinate with could include the PTA or Girl Scouts, as well as Chamber of Commerce. Based on the success and continued buzz surrounding the Financial Literacy event, we hope to see a continuation of that theme.

We have an election year coming up. We should **revisit voter registration card cam-**

paigns as we have done previously. We should coordinate with other groups for the Forum (Chamber, Gazette) to make sure we don't compete for attendees. We can coordinate registration activities with other community events such as the fair, flu shot campaigns, etc. to reach a greater number of people. We may want to consider tracking hours using a sign-in sheet. As we have a election primary year coming up, we will need to begin this process in 9/2017.

More opportunities for involvement may help encourage membership retention. Some non-renewal is normal, approximately 15 per year. We could use carpool **incentives to encourage members to get to know one another and get new members in to the fold.** Remind members of opportunities for ways to get in touch in newsletter – e.g. "**3 Tips for Involvement**". Consistent monthly gatherings and smaller events may encourage ongoing interaction. More reminders about events.

Projects may expand or decrease from year to year for a variety of reasons, including, but not limited to more/less interest in a particular speech topic, conflicting events, laws (HIPA, Title 9). It is okay to reevaluate branch programs and projects to see where members' skills and interests lie then adapt accordingly.

Common themes throughout the day were participation and retention, expanding educa-

Time to select another adventure



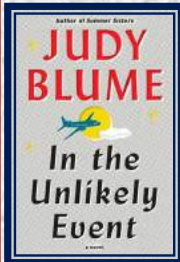

Lauren Groff's third novel, *Fates & Furies*, landed on more 2015 year-end best-of lists than any other work of fiction, and Amazon made it official, stamping its endorsement on *Fates and Furies* as the book of the year. The cherry on the top came from Barack Obama, who told *People* magazine he liked *Fates and*

Furies more than anything else he'd read in 2015. What did our group think? Not so much.

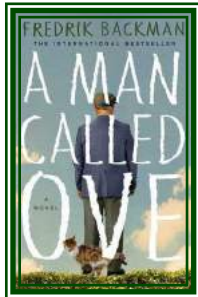
Fates and Furies is about a marriage in which each partner has a radically different view of their union. The first part of the book, *Fates*, is the husband's view of the marriage and the second, *Furies*, the wife's. Some of our best discussions

occur when we have mixed reactions to a book. Beyond discussing the marriage we wove in a conversation about the *Fates and Furies* of Greek mythology and how that title was applicable to the two sections of the book. I think our group found the book interesting but we were mixed on whether we would recommend. ..I would.



***A Man Called Ove* by Fredrik Backman** **August Discussion Review**

Ove (pronounced OOvay) feels old and useless because his job ended resulting in his early retirement. The Swedish author, Fredrik Backman, introduces his protagonist gradually as the story develops. We get to know him as he more or less bumps up against his neighbors, his neighborhood and the local government authorities: the white shirts. Ove knows what is right and wants things done the right way. Are you getting a hint about this curmudg-

eon? There is plenty of humor throughout. Take a leap and meet Ove. Your first impression about him may change as you walk with him through this story.

Backman's technique of telling the "backstory" as the current story progresses worked well for most of us. We liked the story and the telling of it. One member reported that the movie based on *Ove* is good and follows the book.
