

While fire remains a constant threat, the strategy for combating it has evolved with the understanding of its beneficial role in the forest environment.

You are invited to meet Marcia Penner Freedman as she traces the history of firefighting and fire management from the forest's early years through the policy shifts that began in the 1960s and the measures used today.

This will be an informative program offering the community a chance to hear and talk with local author Marcia Penner Freedman who, for fifteen years, split her career between writing and teaching psychology and child development at community col-

Study Group Delves into Geography of Brazil

Brazil's geography was the topic of discussion at the International Group this month. Starting and ending with a brief language lesson, Margaret Erhart and Sandi Gabe reviewed facts about forest, rivers, and the climate. The largest county in South America and the 5th largest country in the world by size and population, Brazil has a population of over 203 million people, including more than 70 isolated and uncontacted native tribes. With over 60% of the Amazon river basin within the borders of the country, the more than four thousand miles of river water ways cover and hold about 2/3rds of the country's area and holds about 1/5th of the world's fresh water. The Amazon rainforest, which covers 60% of Brazil's geography and produces 20% of the earth's oxygen, is in danger of being depleted by the end of the 21st century.

Smoking Loon Old Vine Zinfandel 2012 was the overall winner, and was brought by Kathy and Glenn Sutherland. This was their first winning wine, so it was very exciting! (Yes, we know it really

isn't a competition, and there are no "losers" but it's still nice to have your wine chosen as the best, in our subjective opinions!

2nd place: 2008 Easton Fiddletown Old Vine Zin, Rinaldi Vinyard

3rd place was a tie: Edmeades 2011 Mendocino County Zin; and Gnarley Head Vintage 2013 Old Vine Zin, Lodi

4th place: Opolo Vinyards Summit Creek Zin, Paso Robles 2013.





<u>Highlights of Sept 28, 2015 Board of Directors' Meeting :</u>


- Approved the Aug 17 meeting minutes and Aug 31 and Sept 28 Treasurer's Report.
 Noted for the minutes that the 2015-16 Annual Budget was approved by the membership on Sept. 10.
- Heard report on Membership. Currently 89 members. Member Mixer at River Rock Inn on Sept 10 was very successful with 39 attending in spite of heat. The inaugural New Member Packet has been mailed. Plans are underway for an AAUW "Ladies' Night" at the Alley.
- Heard a report on the successful BackPack Project. Project Chairs presented a summary of outcomes and plans for expanding the project.
- Heard report on Fundraising. Yard Sale profit exceeded projections. Event was expanded to two days and promoted via new social media channels. Reviewed suggestions for next year. Plans for the next fundraiser, "On Safari with AAUW" Fashion Adventure are progressing. Key tasks have been assigned. Promotional materials are designed and printed.
 Tickets have been distributed to members.
- Under "Programs", announced that the October 7 program is on the history and methods of firefighting in the Sierra Nevada.

- In "Project Updates", heard that DWS team is well prepared for the 9/30 event. 55 high school girls will attend the dinner featuring table talks with female scientists; 20 will participate in an earlier program of lab tours. The expense budget will be exceeded due to a reduction in the anticipated donation for meals. Also heard that the application for a \$5,000 grant for an all-day Tech Savvy event has been submitted. Anticipating a response in mid-October. Reported that nine girls will man Tech Trek demonstration booths at the TEDx event on Nov 14.
- Under "New Business", heard presentations by two speakers on possible opportunities for community action by AAUW members. Nancy Martin spoke about One Mariposa, a tutoring program initiated to help at risk youth, which is currently building participation at four schools. Tutors are asked to commit 1 hr/wk. Mariah Lord presented on Mariposa Safe Families, which helps families access resources to navigate through crisis. Volunteer mentors are asked to commit 1 hr/wk for 6 months to work with families on varying needs. The Board agreed to expose the two programs to our members and offer details for volunteering.
- Under "New Business", reviewed the status of the annual goals to date. Discussed recruitment of members for 2016-17 leadership positions. Reviewed the Oct. Branch Buzz for distribution to SIG Chairs.
