

Thirty-five of them also signed up to participate in tours of several labs at UC Merced. This nearly doubled the number of girls who toured labs in 2015, the first year tours were offered.

experiment on them and make them glow like jellyfish."

"I think the most valuable part about this program was I learned more about the science I was interested in."

"It empowers young women to look into different careers."

"I feel like I have more options than I did before."

"I got a lot of input on what field I want to go into and advice about college courses."

"I liked the personal connection rather than hearing a talk to the 'whole class'"

Regarding possible changes, we heard:

"I would want more people to talk to and more variety of careers."

"More presentations and more hands on."

"More time, more lab tours."

It takes a small, hardworking team to put this event together. Trish Gilger from Mariposa youth Impact Project once again was in charge of recruiting the scientists and professionals for the dinner event. Addi-

Fremont Healthcare District and the School Board for Mariposa County Unified School District was held on Wednesday, October 12th at the Mariposa County Supervisors' Chambers. The spacious venue had plenty of room for our attendees, and while we love our "Big Bertha" sound system, the hi-tech Chambers audio set up was a nice treat!

There were just two candidates running in opposition of each other for MCUSD District 2, one of whom was unable to attend, so we went with a re-configured approach. Instead of having a question and answer session, each candidate and one surrogate for the candidate unable to attend were allowed 4 minutes to share information about themselves. This was a great way to get to know some of our current board members as well as a the two candidates running, in an open ended way.

## State perspective on ballot initiatives

# What Do Our 17 Ballot Propositions Say And Do?

How do they affect your life?

A total of 17 measures have qualified for the November 2016 ballot. In addition, there may be county or city measures in your area to be voted on locally. Several propositions amend the state Constitution. Some amend current law (statutes); others create new laws. One is an advisory vote, asking voters' opinions. One is a referendum, seeking to overturn a current law.

Not all of the propositions address issues that relate to AAUW principles, priorities and mission. Five of the seventeen are relevant to AAUW, and we have taken positions on those five. The remainder are categorized as "no position." However, it is important to understand each measure in order to make an educated vote.

The information below gives a summary of each proposition. The AAUW position is noted for each of the five relevant measures, along with the rationale for the position. At the end, there are some references where you can find additional information on any of the propositions.

### SUPPORT

51 (Statute): Authorizes \$9 billion in general obligation bonds for K-12 school construction and modernization, funds for community college buildings, funds for facilities for charter schools and technical education programs.

SUPPORT: adequate and equitable funding for high quality public education for all students

52 (Statute and Constitutional Amendment): Requires two-thirds vote of Legislature to amend a current law that imposes fees on hospitals; fees are used to obtain federal matching funds for Medi-Cal. It directs fees and matching funds to uncompensated care provided by hospitals and to children's health coverage. It eliminates the law's ending date. SUPPORT: guarantee equality, individual rights and social justice for a diverse society; increased access to quality, affordable health care

(Constitutional Amendment): Extends the Prop. 30 (passed by voters in 2012) income tax on high earners through 2030 – currently set to expire in 2019. This will generate \$ 8–11 billion per year to be used for public schools and community colleges, health care for low-income families, and local public safety. The public can track expenditures at www.trackprop30. ca.gov. This does not add new taxes, but continues taxes already in place.

SUPPORT: Support for a strong system of public education; access to quality, affordable health care; guarantee of equality, individual rights and social justice for a diverse society. AAUW supported Prop 30 in 2012.

58 (Statute): Amends 1998's Prop. 227 (which requires children in public schools to be taught in English) to allow public school students who speak limited English to be taught for a defined period of time in languages other than English. Districts using this option must develop an accountability plan and involve a parent advisory committee. Parents may opt out of the program.

SUPPORT: support for a strong system of public education that promotes gender fairness, equity and diversity

#### OPPOSE

53 (Constitutional Amendment): Requires statewide voter approval before state may issue bonds of over \$2 billion to finance a single project. Prohibits dividing projects into segments to avoid public vote. Includes clause that if other bond measures on the ballot that conflict with this measure, and both that measure and this measure pass but this measure gets more votes, then the other measure is null and void ("poison pill clause").


OPPOSE: the "poison pill" clause could nullify Proposition 51, which AAUW is supporting



Margaret Erhart and Sandi Gabe led a discussion about women's issues in Turkey at the October meeting. During the 16th and 17th centuries, women of the Imperial Harem had extraordinary influence on politics of the Ottoman Empire, as many of the Sultans were minors, and their mothers effectively ruled the empire. Today, however, Turkey has a restrictive patriarchal model where rape and honor killings are common, only 33% of women participate in the labor force and an ongoing gender equality struggle is underway. You may recall the case of Ozgecan Aslan, a young Turkish

# Issues for women in Turkey might surprise you

university student who was murdered as she resisted rape after being the last passenger on a bus. Her murder caused nationwide outrage and worldwide demonstrations about the government's "insufficient response" and apparent normalization of rape.

On a lighter note, we learned that despite the role of modesty in the culture, Turkey has a high fashion industry providing an opportunity for women to display beautiful clothing, including headscarves. Turkey is one of only three countries to ban the wearing of headscarves in public (Mexico and France are the other two), and women today go to great lengths to wear them.



# AAUW Mariposa Branch Board Meeting Minutes Library, August 1, 2016

CALL TO ORDER: at 4:08 by Co-President Rebecca Swisher

**MEMBERS PRESENT**: Marilyn Saunders, Cindy Harp, Maddie Brown, Dawn Johnson, Leslie Bernacchi, Rebecca Swisher, Dina Lambert, Saralynn Nusbaum, Sandi Gabe

**Approval of Minutes from September 2016 board meeting:** Minutes were previously submitted, approved by email, & published in June newsletter. Rebecca moved and Cindy seconded.

#### **PROJECT UPDATES:**

#### Dinner with a Scientist- Marilyn Saunders

The event has been scheduled for Thursday October 6. We anticipate 50 girls from Mariposa will participate along with 10 from Merced; 35 are scheduled for lab tours. Marilyn asked if we need a certificate of insurance; in the past we've relied on the university's coverage. The high school has coverage and the bus is insured. Marilyn will request a certificate We have coverage though AAUW whether or not we have a certificate, but it is recommended to secure one for every event. Packets are being stuffed and we will need to match the folders, name tags, and lanyards.

#### Rock the Vote/Candidate Forums- Maddie Brown

Our AAUW branch will be hosting a forum on October 12 for the John C Fremont Hospital Board and the MCUSD Board (District 2) elections at the Mariposa County Supervisors Chambers, 5100 Bullion St. Unopposed candidates will make a 2-3 minute speech. The school district will provide fact sheets for ballot measure L and propositions 51 & 55. The school district candidates will speak at 5:15PM and the JCF candidates at 6:30PM. There will be two moderators, one for the school board positions and one for JCF. Allen McPhee, the JCF CEO will give an introduction regarding how the board functions and the responsibilities of the board members. We understand that one of the JCF candidates will not be able to attend. A request was made to provide bottled water; the request was granted as funds are available and budgeted under voter education. We will need volunteers for set up and tear down. The event will be publicized on Goldrushcam and the chamber blasts. KRYZ has been invited and we can do a public service announcement on KRYZ at no cost. We also discussed posting on the Mariposa Gazette and hospital foundation Facebook pages and in the hospital employee newsletter. Merlin Jones will be hosting a forum the week before in Greeley Hills.

#### **Presentation by Alex Keeton, CTA President**

Alex Keeton addressed the board regarding propositions 51 and 55 and ballot measure L. Key facts for each are provided below:

#### **Prop 55:**

· Continues Prop 30 until 2030

- · Retains tax on those who earn over \$250,000 annually
- · Eliminates a sales tax from Proposition 30
- · Will raise \$8-11 billion dollars for K-14 education

#### Prop 51: A State School Bond for School Renovation and Maintenance

- · Can only be received if school has matching funds
- · Is set to pass statewide
- · Will provide \$9 billion in renovation funds state wide

#### Measure L: Local School Bond

- · Will be used as matching money towards Prop 51
- · Measure L must be passed to receive Prop 51 funds
- · Will cost property owners \$50 per \$100,000 of assessed property value

Phone banking is taking place and volunteers can contact Robin Hopper.

A motion was made to endorse both propositions and ballot measure L. Rebecca moved and Dawn seconded. Maddie will formalize the endorsement and circulate to the board for comments. Our endorsement will be posted on our Facebook page and our website. Subsequent to this board meeting, the school district asked that we send our endorsement letter to the Gazette; the board agreed to do so by electronic vote.

Robin Hopper has been getting grants for improving the HVAC systems in the classrooms.

#### **FUNDRAISER UPDATES:**

#### Fashion Show- Sandi Gabe

The fashion show has been cancelled and will be replaced by a new event in the spring. We are considering a cabaret/French bistro evening featuring a singer, appetizers, a no host bar, and a silent auction. The singer has been lined up and she is prepping for the event which we are planning for February or March. We will be revising the budget by renaming the fashion show line item to "spring event."

#### Yard Sale- Maddie Brown

The yard sale will be held on Friday October 21 from 1-4PM and Saturday October 22 from 9-2 at the home of Helene Fiske. Sharon Enrico will send an email to the membership and she will create flyers. Cindy will publicize in the Gazette and Goldrushcam and she has requested a few photos. Anne and Bruce Richardson are moving and wanted to offer AAUW members first dibs for items they will be selling at their yard sale but we cannot formally publicize for them.


