"The history of travel, exchange, and politics across Eurasia covers tens of thousands of miles of territory, many of the world's religions, dozens of languages, and the entirety of human history from hominid migrations to contemporary conflicts in Iran and Afghanistan. This talk introduces the Silk Road and

explains how I teach about it to students at UC Merced using digital history techniques. Students in my class learn to use Google Earth to organize information about the Silk Road and to create maps that depict historical narratives. Each student completes an interactive digital map about the journey of one Silk Road traveler. I will talk about the Silk Road and showcase some of the students' work."

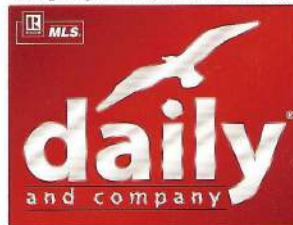

For the official wine tasting portion of the afternoon, we experimented with a different tasting format. The wine bottles were in their numbered bags as usual but instead of everyone tasting the wines in the same sequence, everyone could choose their own tasting order. We then could resample the

various wines as we desired and at our individual pace. Everyone seemed to enjoy the different format.

What a surprise when all was said and done, all five of us had selected the very same wine as our number one pick! This was definitely a first, but its nice nose and rich purple color made it a knock-out in everyone's book! Our undisputed wine of choice that sells for \$17 is **Carnivor 2013!**

To top off the evening, we had a slice of Baileys Irish Cream Chocolate Cake, and the almost Birthday Gal (Jill Rowney) had a candle in her slice!

Visit to Idle Hour Winery

Thank you to Dawna Hunter for arranging a wine tasting at Idle Hour Winery in Oakhurst over Memorial Day weekend. Our Corks and Forks group was joined by a few Bacchus Buddies and visiting holiday guests. Anna Marie dos Remedios, Idle Hour's winemaker, poured for us on her birthday no less! Anna Marie and her partner Deb Payne began making wine in 2007 in San Benito County and opened the Oakhurst winery in 2008. Their focus is on small lot, single-vineyard designated wines. They opened the winery in 2008 and since

have opened a tasting room in Carmel Valley featuring their central coast Pinot Noirs. The winery is named for Anna Marie's grandfather's Chinese junk that she and her family enjoyed in Hong Kong, her birthplace.

We started the tasting with Viognier. Viogniers can be fruity, almost sweet wines, best enjoyed in the afternoon with fruit and cheese. Idle Hour's was clean and crisp and a favorite of the group. We then moved on to reds start-

ing with Pinot Noir, made famous, *and expensive*, years ago by the movie *Sideways*. Anna Marie's style differs from the fruit forward, full bodied, heavily oaked California reds that many of us are familiar with; her wines are made more in the French style. All are fermented using native yeasts which come

from the vineyards with the fruit. She stressed that her style is non-interventive; they do as little as possible to allow the vineyard's true expression to come forth. We then moved on to a few Tempranillos, one of which won a double gold in the San Francisco Chronicle wine competition. We finished with Cabernet Franc, my favorite of the reds.

While we were tasting, Anna

Marie told us about the wines she would be enjoying for her birthday along with twelve guests. Never afraid to ask questions, I had to ask if she would be drinking any wines aside from Idle Hour's and the answer was yes, Calera Pinot Noir, among others. I imagined the sumptuous birthday meal she would enjoy and again just had to ask. The answer...burgers!

The Pecan Man

The story of the “Pee-can” Man begins in the summer of 1975 in a small town in Florida. “Whatever it was about him that struck people as frightful, it didn’t take long before parents took to calling their children in whenever he appeared.”

The storyteller, Ora Lee, is a white childless woman whose husband recently died. She busies herself with baking cookies for charities, but eventually she finds that befriending her black maid, Blanche, and Blanche’s four children is much more gratifying.

However, several horrific tragedies occur. Ora Lee and others make up lies to protect loved ones, but the lies just get more and more entangled and involved. As Ora Lee says, “Once a lie is told, you have to keep on telling. You not only have to repeat it time and time again, you have to embellish it, layer upon layer until you don’t even remember the truth.”

Near the end of the story, you discover that the Pecan Man who first appeared as a loner feared by the entire community was more connected to the other characters than any of them ever suspected.

Public Policy

AAUW adopts Public Policy issues at both the National and State levels and actively lobbies for supportive legislation. The issues cover a broad range of topics from Equal Pay, Title IX and “Get Out the Vote.”

Here in Mariposa, our Public Policy efforts focus on Voter Education on AAAUW elections and issues as well as helping community members prepare for local elections and register to vote. We remind residents to vote and hand out voter registration cards, but do not register voters. We have conducted this effort in both South and North County. Among the stories of our successes are the fact that we have helped local resident military personnel and veterans who are in transit register to vote.

We encourage voter registration with youngsters by providing informational “Birthday Cards” for seniors at MCHS. These packets are delivered in the classroom by the counselors on the 18th birthday of students... the class sings “Happy Birthday” so it is a memorable occasion. Peggy Shainberg has headed up this project for a number of years.

Candidate Forums are an AAUW specialty. We’ve held these over the last several election cycles. Kris Casto led the effort to re-establish these after a hiatus of some years and many community forums were held under Sandi Gabe’s

leadership. The forums have provided voters with an opportunity to get to know local, non-partisan candidates.

In other areas of Public Policy, our branch has hosted film screenings on thought-provoking issues such as *Miss Representation*, held public programs with topical speakers, sponsored the Women's History Month initiative, promoted a Robert Reich webinar and kept our members updated on topical policy issues in each month’s newsletter.

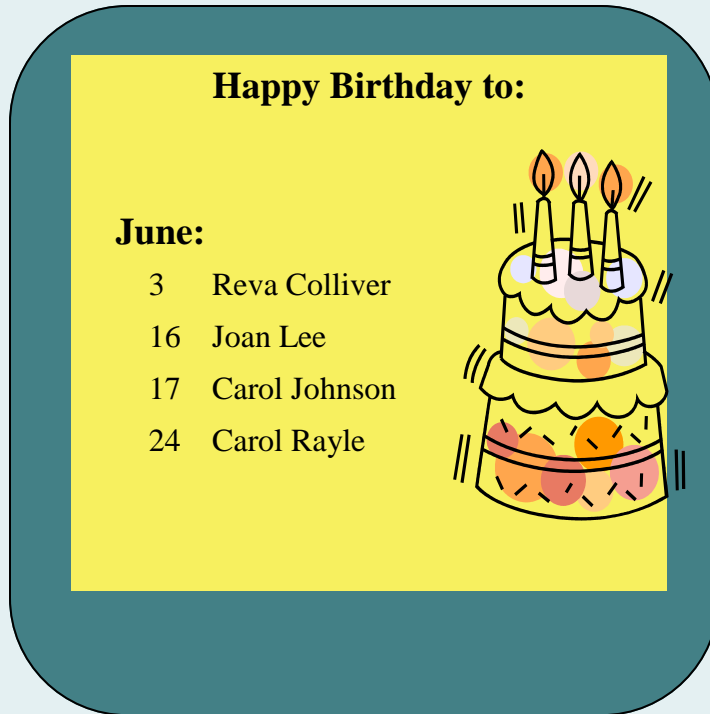
Silk Road.
