In spite of sparse attendance due to spring vacation, those who came were treated to a fascinating presentation by Dr. Wolfgang Rogge of UC Merced. The event was part of Karen's clever *Cap 'n Town* series designed to expose us to interesting research being done right in our own back yard by the talented experts who live right in our own community.

Dr. Rogge gave an engaging and understandable explanation of his extensive research on the varying impact of different styles of cooking, types of foods and kinds of cooking equipment on air quality. It was particularly interesting to hear exactly how the experiments were set up and how variables were controlled. Remember *The Scientific Method* that you had to study? It is alive and well. Some of his results may have been guessable; some were complete surprises. The biggest takeaway for the audience was: Eat out more!

Wine Group



Prosecco was the wine chosen by our hosts Wendy Carman and Dennis Waheed and it was a lovely way to while away three hours this past Sunday with our Corks and Forks group. Joining us were Dina Lambert, Jeff Gabe, Lynn and Cindy Harp, Don Melcher and Saralynn Nusbaum. Prosecco is a sparkling wine produced in Italy from the glera grape. Glera is a highly productive grape that ripens late in the season. It has high acidity and a fairly neutral palate, making it ideal for production of sparkling wine. Prosecco has become quite popular; it is light bodied, low in alcohol, and reasonably priced when compared to other sparkling whites. The group sampled five different wines and, of course, a selection of delicious appetizers. It is

said that Prosecco’s aromatic profile is characterized by white peaches with an occasional soapy note. Only the winning wine, a *Ruffino*, brought by Lynn and Cindy Harp had much of a nose. *Masquerade*, brought by Dennis and Wendy came in second. Jeff noted that this wine had a round feel in the mouth. Others tasted were *Headsnapper*, *Kirkland*, and *Lamarca*. We ended the evening with a delicious and refreshing strawberry dessert. 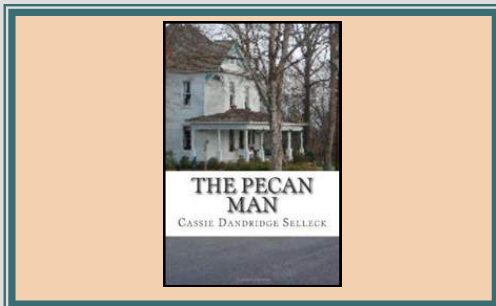

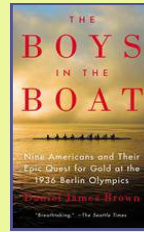

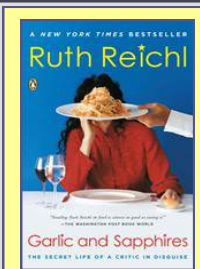
We had a full house for our book group on Tuesday. We started with the following Youtube book trailer which gave an inspiring start to our discussion.

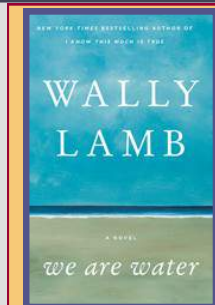

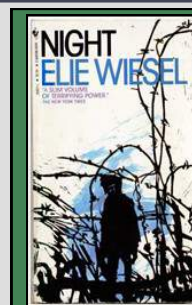

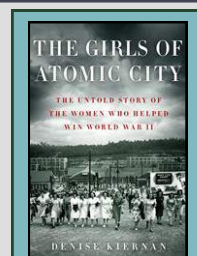

Board Action- April, 2015

The Board of Directors' meetings are typically the first Monday of the month at 4:00 at the library. As always, everyone is invited to attend and see what we do! Now Let's Get Down to Business.....

Highlights of April 6, 2015 Board of Directors' meeting:


- Approved the March 2 meeting minutes and March 31 Treasurer's Report. In reviewing the Treasurer's Report, it was noted that General Funds money had been transferred to zero out negative balances for projects which do not generate revenue (e.g. Speech Trek). The report form has been modified to show such transfers.
- Heard report on Membership. Currently 99 members. Candidates for Honorary Memberships (3) afforded by the national *Shape the Future* program must be selected at the May Board meeting. Some names suggested. Discussed preliminary plans for the June annual meeting/brunch. Theme will be honoring the founding members; possible sites were considered.
- Heard report on Fundraising. Plans are progressing well for the May Home Tour of 10 kitchens. Two tickets are being distributed to each member to buy/sell. The brochure and map are nearly ready for the printers; website is live; docents have been secured; publicity is extensive; food planning is underway.
- Programs VP reported that everything is ready for April 9 program on Cooking and Air Quality. Next Cap 'n Town event in June will be about a UCM project to study the influence of the Silk Road.
- In "Other Reports", heard a report on the March Leadership Development Day attended by four members, a description of the Women's History Month proclamation by the BOS and an announcement that our branch's Speech Trek contestant earned fifth place in the state competition.
- Tech Trek Coordinator Margaret Brandenburg gave a special report updating the Board on the *Tech Trek* program and the selection procedures. After a comprehensive process including interviews, six girls and one alternate were chosen and notified. Board members were invited to a "get acquainted" party for both new and old campers on May 16 @ Miner's Inn @ 2:00. All members are invited to Visitors' Day at camp on June 19.
- Under "New Business", members were reminded of upcoming national and state elections and informed of a fundraiser for youth programs hosted by our *Dinner with a Scientist* program co-sponsor, MyIP. It was confirmed that the list of open Board positions and proposed candidates was published in the April newsletter.
