



Reading Yann Martel's prose is akin to listening to a delightful piece of music, eating a delectable morsel, or musing over a beautiful painting. The writing itself is simply a wonderful experience. But then he weaves a trio of unlikely tales, deal-

"Some people never laugh again. Others take to drink," Martel writes. "Walking backwards, his back to the world, his back to God, he is not grieving. He is objecting.

ing with loss and resulting grief:

Because when everything cherished by you in life has been taken away, what else is there to do but object?"

Martel weaves humor, religion, and bizarre fantasy into each of the three - stories that really DO ultimately relate to each other. The book might leave the reader a bit unsettled, but that almost warrants a second or third reading!

Ron Charles of the Washington Post published a <u>review</u> of *The High Mountains of Portugal* that might whet your literary appetite.

Deciding that it was a steep climb beyond that, we turned to head back making a detour in the "town" of Bennetville. The Forest Service has reconstructed two of the buildings of a town that once boasted 10,000 people! 
