

Expresso on November 16 for our monthly "Mini -Member Meet-up." As these sessions generally go, we discussed many different topics. Foremost in our minds was the excellent Rural Health program that was presented by Mariposa AAUW on November 14. It was noted that there is a proposal to increase the sales tax in Mariposa County by 1% to help fund a new hospital needed by 2030 because of earthquake construction requirements. We discussed how important it will be to provide adequate information to the voters, not only about the necessity of having access to local health care, but the impact that losing the hospital would have on

the local economy in both job loss and revenue loss to local businesses. We discussed some of the general barriers to healthcare access in rural areas, one of them being accessible and adequate supermarkets. We also discussed the fact that today's children may not have the opportunity to have the economic security their parents enjoyed, and conversely, some of today's youth may also feel entitled to things without having put in the work to achieve them.




What does "Havers" mean, anyway?

Although dull and humorless, he becomes a successful politician, mainly due to her clever rewrites of his speeches and behind-thescenes people skills. She puts up with his



puffed-up ego, his lack of appreciation for her, and his attraction to the indolent and vapid Miss Sybil in the hopes that he will see her value in the end. And he does. And that's the end.

When we finished, we weren't really sure "what every woman knows," although we guessed it was that there are subtle ways to get what

we want. But what really intrigued us was the frequent exclamation of "havers!" We don't know what it means, but we intend to use it regularly.


