### Selecting this year's trekkers—no small task

We are in the process of selecting our candidates to attend this year's Tech Trek camp at Fresno State in June. When we started the process, we did not yet know the dates of camp. The dates were finally sent to us at the end of January and we found out that camp is the last week of school for our girls again this year. It was good to find out that that did not keep any of our girls from applying! They were happy to miss the last week of school to attend camp if they were selected. We did, however, lose several applicants who are participating in the Washington DC trip. The DC trip would leave the day after they got back from camp and these girls decided that two big, week-long events back to back was too much and they chose to back out of applying to Tech Trek—understandably. We have this conflict every other year when the DC trip occurs.

Our Tech Trek project could not happen without the help of many of our members. Thanks to Barbara Silva for helping to coordinate this project with me. Being involved in Tech Trek is a great way to help your AAUW branch in a small, rewarding way. Thank you to all who have stepped up to help.

First of all, in January, we had our liaisons visit each school site to introduce the program to 7<sup>th</sup> grade girls. We had girls who attended last year's camp come and help us talk to the 7<sup>th</sup> graders to share what camp was all about. Thank you to the liaisons this year. We had Phyllis Weber again helping out the girls at El Portal and Yosemite. We had a new member volunteer to help at Catheys Valley. Rick Uebner stepped up to fill that gap for us and has said he is interested in doing it again

next year. I worked with the girls at MES and Woodland. This is such a rewarding experience working with these girls. It is fun to get to know them as we work on their applications and essays together. The applications were all turned in by January 31<sup>st</sup> ready for the scorers.

The next step is the scoring of the applications. This is always such a hard job! We do want to thank those members who stepped up to help out with this task, too. The scorers this year are: Carrie Lindstrom, Belinda Gilbert, Carol Hart, Dawn Johnson and Jody Sergienko. They read through the applications scoring the answers to questions and the essays. This is done blindly. All names and identifying information, as well as school site, are covered so the scorers do not know whose application they are scoring. These will all be completed by the end of February.

The next step will occur on March 7th. This is the interview day. This year our interviewers are Dawna Hunter, Becky Mock and Sara Robison. These members have offered to give up an afternoon to meet our candidates and interview them. The interview scores will be combined with the application scores and we will notify our lucky Tech Trekkers soon after that!

Tech Trek camp is such a wonderful opportunity for our Mariposa girls. They spend a week in the dorms and participate in many science and math activities. They gain life skills and hopefully something sparks their interest and they attend college in a few years ready to learn more!

## A view into the harsh realities of life in Guatemala and Honduras

Our International Studies group had a very interesting and lively meeting in our study of Central America on February 11. Charles (Chuck) Mosher, M.D. and Tiina Wilson teamed up to present their research on Guatemala and Honduras for us.

*Antigua, Guatemala*

Tiina's talk on Guatemala, accompanied by pictures of that country, showed us the plight of much of the population where violence and poverty rule. Men have moved north to find work, and women and children have little protection from gangs and violence. The country has great natural beauty and has a large indigenous Mayan population. It has the most volcanoes of the seven countries in Central America. The United Fruit Company

exploited the land and the people for raising and exporting bananas, setting the stage for the vast gulf between rich and poor in these two "Banana Republics."

Chuck gave an account of Honduras where, unlike Guatemala, there is a large coast on the Caribbean and most of the population is mestizo, a mix of indigenous and people of European ancestry. Problems of corruption, violence and interference in political affairs by the U.S. are similar to those of Guatemala. MS-13 and Barrio 18 gang members from Los Angeles were deported to Central America and now pose a danger to all. Hurricane Mitch in 1998 hit the Miskito Coast of Honduras and wiped out many of its farms and plantations of bananas, the country's major crop.

Of great interest to our group of 20 participants was Chuck's most recent trip to Honduras. He and another former Peace Corps volunteer worked with young people who were missing limbs or whose bones had grown abnormally. They were able to fit three children and a young man of 19 with prostheses so that they could walk upright for the first time.

Our group was inspired by the stories of these young people. We are grateful to both Chuck and Tiina for their excellent program.

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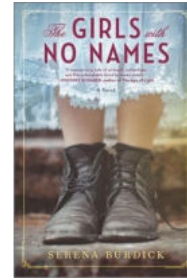

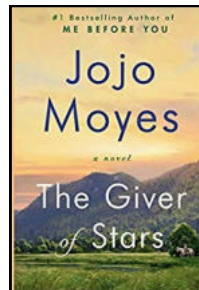

Based on a program that was instituted by Eleanor Roosevelt in the mid 1930's, *The Giver of Stars* is about a group of women in Kentucky that begin a traveling library that delivers books to rural areas on horseback. These "pack horse librarians" must overcome a number of obstacles on their way to bringing literacy to the masses, but they do so and tackle these challenges together. Our main character is Alice Wright, a British woman who marries American Bennett Van Cleve, hoping to escape her stifling life in England. Alice soon discovers that her

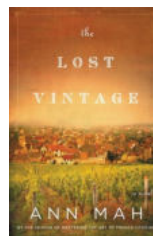
handsome husband is not terribly interested in her and there are hints throughout the book that he's probably gay. To top it off, she and Bennett are living in Bennett's father's home and he is a total brute. Given this situation, Alice seizes upon the opportunity to become a pack

horse librarian.

In doing my research for our discussion, I discovered a plagiarism controversy surrounding the book's release. A book called *The Woman of Troublesome Creek* was published a few months ahead of *The Giver of Stars*. The author of that book felt that some of the details were suspiciously similar. Moyes denies having read that book. Hmmm....
