No one expected to be isolated to such extent as we are presently (April 1, 2020). His information was timely and right on topic!



Migration – not just a recent phenomenon

The Great Decisions group was hosted on March 11 by Betty Massey and Belinda Gilbert. Six members were in attendance. The discussion ranged widely and covered both the book topic "Refugees and Global Migration" and the migration of Guatemalan refugees to the southern border of the United States. This latter topic was of special interest to Betty, as she had recently attended an International Studies SIG meeting which focused on the challenges of living in Guatemala.

According to the Great Decisions article, migration has been an integral part of all world cultures throughout history and is not simply a phenomenon that can be stopped. Migration occurs along a spectrum. At one end there are those who have no choice and are forced to move (persecution, to escape war or conflict and because they can no longer support their families). At the other end of the spectrum are those who move by choice (for work, education, health resources, for family reasons). Since 2015 the governments of many countries have closed their borders to migrants. Regular migration access to Europe was already limited, but after the 2015-16 mass migration from Syria, and other mid-eastern and African countries, borders have been closed entirely. Migration has become exceedingly more difficult.

Many countries see migration as a problem which must be solved. This takes many forms:

 giving people incentives and training to people to remain in their own countries

- preventing people from gaining access by building borders and walls
- using repatriation methods such as forced deportation
- giving voluntary incentives to people to return to their own countries or to transit countries.

Many of the policies and programs to help people stay in their home country are funded at the national or international level by Europe or America, based on the assumption that improving the situation of people in their home countries will make them less likely to want to leave. The reintegration or repatriation of returning migrants is a policy initiative to encourage people not to migrate again.

One such program mentioned in the article about Guatemala was an initiative financed by the United States in 2015. This was a national initiative project to help villages in Guatemala respond to climate change. The total grant was \$190,000 over three years which was enough for trained agronomists to show community members how to diversify crops, conserve water and how to reforest surrounding countryside. (Many residents had resorted to making money cutting down trees to sell as firewood during drought years). This initiative resulted in the community members making tremendous advancements in agriculture. In 2017, during the Trump administration, the initiative grant ended. The members of the "Great Decisions" noted the positive effects of this initiative and hope it can be reintroduced in the near future.





Looking for the laughter on the 23rd floor




The Girls with No Names

by Serena Burdick

Discussion Review

Serena Burdick's The Girls with No

<u>Names</u> tells the tale of free-spirited sisters Luella and Effie Tildon who live in New York City, near the House of Mercy, a home for wayward girls that is anything but merciful. Effie can't conceive of a time when she and Luella won't be living happily ever after until Luella disappears, setting in motion a devastating series of events. Believing that her sister has been committed by their father to the House of Mercy, Effie hatches a plan to get committed—and when she discovers she's wrong, she becomes a prisoner, largely dependent on another resident, Mable. Effie's parents, meanwhile, have no idea where she is, believe she's been kidnapped, and are moving heaven and earth to find her. Told from the alternating points of view of Effie; her mother, Jeanne; and Mable, the narrative combines lush prose with a quick and riveting plot... (Content liberally adapted from *Publishers* Weekly review).



Our discussion covered the typical book group questions that you can imagine but then the conversation got more interesting when we reviewed some historical information about Magdalene Laundries, the institutions that housed

"wayward" women to ostensibly teach them a trade, and wrestled with the inevitable questions about how things went so terribly wrong. How did the admirable concept of providing support to women in need result in the torture and treatment of those same women? We were reminded of the Stanford prison experiment that investigated the psychological effects of perceived power, focusing on the struggle between prisoners and prison officers. While the method and results of that experiment have been called into question, it reminded us of the impact of unequal bases of power.

We delved into the background of women's prisons. The Indiana Women's Prison, originally known as the Indiana Reformatory Institution for Woman and Girls, has been considered to be the first separate

prison for women in the United States. That designation was called into question by two researchers in the Indiana Women's Prison Higher Education Program when they evaluated the type of inmates that were sent to the prison. They noted that despite the fact that sex-related offenses were common, few inmates were incarcerated for that reason. They proposed that the Magdalene Laundries established throughout the nation in the 1940s actually served as the first private women's prisons. The House of Mercy was one of 18 such institutions founded before 1900.

Initially the House of Mercy, established in the 1850's, was built to house 154 female "inmates" and staffed by the Roman Catholic Sisters of Mercy. While conditions inside the House of Mercy might be considered inhumane by modern standards, the huge brick structure included such amenities as steam heat, light, ventilation and plumbing.

Not long after the house was established, reports began to surface claiming that cruel and unusual punishments, isolation cells, and bread and water diets were routine behind the walls of the House of Mercy and the institution was accused of "locking inmates in a small room or cell without food or water for periods varying from one to five days...

corporal infliction by whipping, the use of a gag, handcuffs and a straight jacket....that inmates are not permitted to communicate with or to see friends for long periods of time." Surprisingly the nuns did not contest the statements.

By March of 1919, the House of Mercy had fallen on hard times and by 1921, the storied building, ironically, was leased briefly to the New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children.

In 1933, New Yorker contributor Morris Markey made a trip to Inwood Hill Park and toured the ground going through dark, cluttered halls where he found the old laundry room with its slate walls. On them, dimly visible in that light, were messages of despair from forgotten souls who once wept above the suds.

- "I wish I was dead."
- "God help me to get out of here."
- "I was put in this House of Mercy for nothing."

While the book has achieved acclaim in the literary community, most of us were lukewarm about recommending it. Some felt emotionally wrung-out by the continual descriptions of abuse while others were unmoved because many of the scenes seemed implausible and the book lacked character development.


