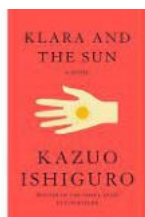

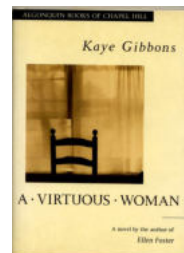

Christina Oborn
has just joined us

and looks forward to her first meetings of the Great Decisions and Play Reading SIG's. Christina was born in Detroit, lived for a time in Illinois, moved to Sacramento, and finally to San Francisco for her

middle school and high school years. She attended Sonoma State University for a time before transferring to San Francisco State University where she graduated with a degree in political science. She also attained a masters degree in public administration.

So what does a woman with those credentials do with herself? Why, of course, she works in the wine industry. Christina worked in finance for the Sonoma Vineyards, now known as Rodney Strong. She then went on to work at Sebastiani Vineyards in public relations and marketing. As a wine industry employee, Christine has had several courses in wine tasting and food and wine pairing. I am trying to convince her to join the Corks and Forks SIG to share her expertise with us. When asked how she happened upon the wine industry, Christina shrugs and says she was looking for a job after graduation, and that's what she found. I suspect the free tasting and the gorgeous wine country settings were an additional incentive.



Later Christina changed careers and moved into education. She first worked for San Mateo Community College district marketing classes such as economic development and business writing for corporations. She moved up to Program Manager for Contract Education and eventually to Dean of Sponsored Research and Grants.

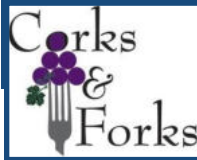

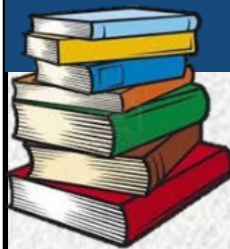
The Art SIG met Wednesday the 22nd at 1850. Only four of us were able to make it, but we did throw around some ideas and booked the first SIG event.

November's event was a suggested walking tour of Mariposa's own downtown studios; details TBD. Other ideas included-

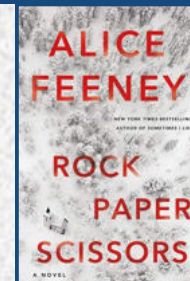
- A big trip to one of the museums along the coast such as the Dali Museum

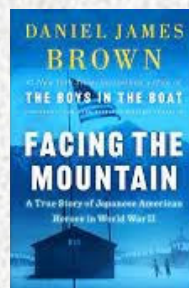

***Facing the Mountain* by Daniel James Brown**

This book is an intense look at the lives of Japanese-Americans incarcerated during World War II and the men who served in the 442nd Regiment. Even with Brown's skill of personalizing and telling the story, its subject made it difficult to read. However, it did generate good discussion and reflection by our group.

Four young men, three who fought and one a Quaker conscientious objector, are the focus, and their challenges as American citizens who



were loyal but treated as suspected aliens give us a picture of the general attitude of those times. We questioned if the racism and discrimination they suffered in the past century differs greatly from the conditions we face today.

Brown included extensive interviews with families of these men and others as well as the archival resources of the Densho Project to tell the story of these men and their families. People who were forced to close businesses, leave their homes, and enter what amounted to concentration camps still, largely, maintained their loyalty to the United States while enduring tremendous hardships.

It is a challenging but solid book.



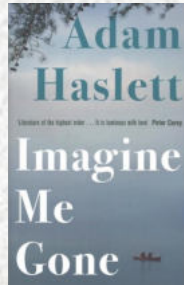

Imagine Me Gone by Alex Haslett

"The monster you lie with is your own. The struggle is endlessly private. I thought it was over. That one night the beast at my back would squeeze more tightly and I would cease breathing. What remained of me hoped for it."

Do I have your attention?

In *Imagine Me Gone*, Margaret faces a choice when her fiancé, John, is hospitalized for depression. She decides to marry him and we begin a journey that unfolds from this act of love and faith. At the heart of it is their eldest son, Michael, a brilliant, anxious music fanatic, and the story of how, over the span of decades, his younger siblings - the responsible Celia and the tightly controlled Alec - struggle along with their mother to care for Michael's increasingly troubled existence.

In this third novel, Haslett calls upon his experience of losing his father at 14 when mental illness intervened and caused his father to take his own life. Told through five family members' perspectives, the characters narrate the story from their own points of view. They capture the essence of what it is

to deal with a mental illness and give us language to describe and understand the profound effects on their lives.

National Public Radio praised Haslett's novel saying, "Haslett's signature achievement in *Imagine Me Gone* is to

temper the harrowing with the humorous while keeping a steady bead on the pathos. You want sympathetic characters? You want a narrative that showcases love as a many-splendored thing capacious enough to encompass stalwart, long-suffering spouses, loyal siblings, suffocatingly obsessive crushes, and casual, noncommittal relationships (both gay and straight) that morph as if by magic into soul-sustenance? You want writing that thrums with anguish and compassion? It's all here."

Our discussion reflected on our own families and friends and we considered the tough questions of whether mental illness is passed through families and what responsibility and power we have to intervene to change important people in our life.

AAUW WEIGHS IN AT THE FEDERAL LEVEL

AAUW is actively lobbying for major legislation in Congress. Two bills sponsored by California representatives are of special interest.

Women's health: Reproductive rights are at serious risk in our country now. The Women's Health Protection Act, (H.R.3755), sponsored by Rep. Judy Chu (CA-27), has passed the House and is on the Senate legislative calendar. This urgent bill would protect abortion access.

Title IX: The *Patsy Mink and Louise Slaughter Gender Equity in Education Act (GEEA)* (H.R.4097), sponsored by Rep. Doris Matsui (CA-6), includes provisions for more resources, training, and technical assistance to support full implementation of Title IX. Also, AAUW staff are in close contact with Miguel Cardona, the new Secretary of Education, to reverse egregious Title IX policy changes made by the previous Secretary Betsy DeVos. In its 16th year, Speech Trek, AAUW California's signature high school program, continues to honor its original purpose: "...to promote understanding and communication of mission-critical issues among high school students through their research, preparation, and presentation of high-quality speeches while promoting the value of public speaking as a life

and leadership skill."

However, Speech Trek is transcending its original purpose. The power of Speech Trek can be witnessed not only through students' inspirational speeches at the local and state levels but also can be seen in the classroom, where teachers have:

- assigned Speech Trek topics as extra credit
- required the topic as a written assignment
- incorporated the topic into the curriculum
- used the topic as a springboard for "lively classroom discussions"

The power of Speech Trek can also be seen in the community, where:

- a contestant's mother reluctantly joined a Toastmasters Club to help her daughter, and joyfully found it propelling her on her own communication journey
- a contestant was invited to present her speech at her city council and inspired city officials to consider her recommendations for change
- a high school freshman and her mother sought out AAUW to compete in Speech Trek (and subsequently won 1st Place!)
