Life or Death of Mariposa's Hospital

No, the above photo is not me though my hair sometimes does look like this...It's Roseanne Roesannadana, a character from Saturday Night Live circa the 1970s. She was SNL's consumer affairs reporter and she would pose absurd questions to which she would respond with nonsensical rambling answers. Somehow I am channeling Roseanne as I contemplate explaining why we need to keep our hospital. Why? Because I think this is an absurd question.

Why **WOULDN'T** we want to keep our hospital? Unlike Roseanne, however, I will attempt to stay on point with my answer.

John C. Fremont Hospital (JCF) is facing closure in 2030 for failure to meet California's strict seismic safety standards. You may recall, in 2020, Measure N was placed on the ballot; it did not gather the threshold needed to pass. Measure O, which will be on the June ballot, differs from Measure N in three key ways:

terminate the one percent sales tax after 40 years. The current 0.5% sales tax is set to expire, so the District will only be receiving 1.5% for just over two of the 40 years, from January 2023 to March 2025, after which the total will be 1.0% or a one-half percentage point increase over what is being paid now. By the time it expires, that tax



will have paid off previous debt (in the form of bonds) to fund an expansion project that began in 1994 to enable the District to offer more services and achieve its current strong financial footing. Good finances are essential to getting an affordable bond or loan for building the new hospital and making the other improvements being funded by Measure O. A 1% sales tax will raise approximately \$2,800,000 annually, and inflation will cause that amount to increase

over the years. It is important to note that about one-third of Mariposa County's total sales tax receipts come from purchases made by tourists.

- It revises the Expenditure Plan to more clearly describe how the funds can be spent.
- It adds an "Accountability and Transparency" section to require more rigorous accounting.

If passed, Measure O will provide these benefits to the residents of Mariposa County for generations to come:

- Prevent our hospital and its emergency room from losing their license to operate in 2030 for failure to comply with California's seismic safety standards
- Ensure that our hospital and its emergency room can stay open and remain fully operational during any natural disaster, including a major earthquake, to provide essential medical care 24/7
- Enable the expansion and/or enhancement of emergency and other medical care to treat more patients more quickly and more effectively
- Replace diagnostic and patient support equipment that becomes outdated with modern, state-of-the-art technology
- Expand and enhance the services being offered in both the Mariposa and Northside clinics
- Make it easier for the Healthcare

District, with a new, modern facility, to attract and retain the highly qualified medical professionals, including specialists, needed to better serve our community

If Measure O does NOT pass:

Most of you probably know what is meant by "the golden hour." The golden hour is the term often used in trauma or emergency care to suggest that an injured or sick person must receive definitive treatment within the first 60 minutes from the time of injury or appearance of symptoms. This is particularly critical for stroke victims. Without our hospital it is quite unlikely care could be provided within this time frame.

Some have asked why not replace JCF with an urgent care clinic? Urgent care clinics are not a substitute for emergency rooms. They rarely operate 24/7 and invariably lack the sophisticated medical imaging and patient support equipment needed to diagnose and treat medical emergencies, such as traumatic injuries, strokes, heart attacks, and other potentially lifethreatening conditions. So, let's jump ahead to 2031 and we have no hospital; you've badly cut yourself trying to be clever with a chainsaw. You scramble to the car, race to the urgent care clinic, and



there is a sign on the door, "Back After Lunch."

JCF employs 200 people which represents a payroll of roughly \$12M. These employees likely have partners who are employed in the county and they might have children. If the hospital closes, many of these families will be forced to leave the county. When they leave, they will no longer frequent our local businesses, attend our churches, support our community organizations, AAUW among many others, and their children will no

longer attend our schools. Our thriving community will become one of those sleepy little former gold rush towns that dot Highway 49.

So, to sum up, as Roseanne Roesannadana would say, "It just goes to show you. It's always something. If it's not one thing, it's another."



"Inventing Anna" on Netflix.
The series is based on the true story of a young woman who scammed high society and New York lawyers by claiming to be a wealthy German heiress named Anna Delvey. From 2013 to 2017, she defrauded or inten-

tionally deceived major financial institutions, banks, hotels, and acquaintances in the United States for over \$275,000. She served almost four years in jail in the U.S. and may be deported back to Germany. There are nine episodes available.

Beth also endorsed many recommendations that have been presented in Member Corner. She enjoyed the novel *The Sentence*, the movie "Don't Look Up", and the book *Saving Us* which she read as part of Gary Colliver's climate SIG.







Jill Harry watched "We Need to Talk About Cosby" which can be seen on Showtime, Hulu, YouTube TV, and other streaming platforms. This four-episode series starts with Cosby's early days on television and goes through his

conviction and release from prison. Interviews with his victims, former coworkers, and others influenced by him are featured. The series explores how Cosby's public persona was so drastically different from his private behavior. We are forced



to reconcile what we once believed about a beloved entertainer versus the harm he inflicted on so many victims.



Jill also recommends a science fiction novel titled *Ancillary Justice* which was the debut book from author Anne Leckie. This novel, which won numerous awards, is the first part of the Imperial Radch trilogy.

The main character is Breq, who was once the AI system of a battalion spaceship called "Justice of Toren." Now Breq is an ancillary (think soldier) who is on a mission to avenge the death of her former leader, Captain Awn, of whom she was especially fond. Jill says that the characters are richly drawn and the book sparks many philosophical questions and thoughts. It would be an interesting book club selection. Jill is looking forward to the next two books in the trilogy, Ancillary Sword and Ancillary Mercy.



Lynch writes in his article Putin's Russia, "...the balance of power between Moscow and Washington in favor of the latter combined with irreconcilable objectives regarding the international status of Russia's historical borderlands undermined leaders' efforts to build a stable and mutually beneficial relationship." It is confounding to most Americans how the Russian people appear to support Putin, but he has had successes in creating a stable economy and reestablishing Russian cultural pride at home. Putin's desire to expand Russian

influence to that of the Soviet Union and the threat of NATO expansion has contributed to Putin's actions. This is coupled with Putin amending existing laws that potentially extend his term limits to 2036 while concurrently neutralizing any political opposition. The invasion of Ukraine is an extension of Putin's actions since he has been in power.
