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

Staying well with common sense "tools"


Tiina Wilson recommends two well-made documentaries. The first is called **The Game**



Changers. This documentary tells the story of James Wilks, an elite Special Forces trainer and The Ultimate Fighter Winner as he travels the world on a quest to find the optimal diet

for human performance. He uncovers some fascinating historical information, such as the diet of the Roman gladiators was largely plant-based. Very little meat or dairy was found in the remains of the bones found in a cemetery where the arena fighters were buried. Well-known athletes contribute to this study of the relationship between food and true strength.

Tiina’s second recommendation is **Cowspiracy**. This feature-length environmental documentary is about the animal agriculture industry. Animal agriculture is the leading cause of deforestation, water consumption, and pollution, and is responsi-



ble for more greenhouse gases than the transportation industry. Raising cattle in the traditional way is also a primary driver of rainforest destruction, habitat loss, topsoil erosion, ocean “dead zones” and other damages to our environment. The film offers ideas for a path to global sustainability for a growing population. Tiina says that the documentaries are both “relevant and real eye-openers”, and can be viewed on Netflix.

Beth Tomsick recommends the film **CODA**, which stands for “child of deaf adults.” The film portrays the story of Ruby, a 17-year-old hearing child of deaf parents. She is caught having to choose between helping her family in their fledgling fish business in Gloucester, Massachusetts,



and pursuing her singing plans in college. There were many deaf actors cast for this movie and one of them, Troy Kotsur, won an Academy Award for Best Supporting Actor. *Coda* also won the big prize, the Academy Award for Best Picture of the Year.

The Citizens to Save the Hospital, a grass roots group of private citizens, has written an ordinance to be included on the June 7 primary ballot. It asks voters to approve a one percent sales tax to build a new hospital.

By 2030, all hospitals must comply with current seismic standards or close their doors for good. The closure of the hospital would mean the loss of healthcare in Mariposa County. It would also mean the loss of over



Changing of the world demographics; Impact of climate change on migration

Two chapters in Great Decisions impacted each other so we discussed them both. The first chapter was interesting as it explored how the demographics of the world are changing. Some of the reasons:

1. **Mortality:** Due to improved medical care, lifespan has increased.
2. **Population:** Population is declining in part due to urbanization, education, improvement in the status of women, and the availability of contraceptives. In some countries, females tend to be under valued and subsequently female babies are likely to be aborted.
3. **Aging:** As the population of older citizens grows, the ratio of fewer working taxpayers to retired persons is putting stress on governments to find the money to meet the financial, social, and medical need of the elderly.
4. **International migration:** About 30% of the migrants live in Europe, 20% in North America, nearly 33% reside in Asia, and 10% in Africa. There are also enormous shifts in the population within countries, including the United States.
5. **Family composition:** The extended family in a single residence is less and

less common. Families are moving into single-family homes. Rather than moving in with their children's families, elders maintain their own independent residences.

All of these factors put stress on countries to meet the needs of their total populations.

Impact of climate change on migration:

We coupled that chapter with one on climate change as it will impact migration. Governments around the world recognize there is a problem and have agreed to reduce greenhouse emissions. However, when it is time to report on what they have achieved, not much has actually been done. In addressing climate change, the political parties throughout the world seem to be more concerned with blocking each other's efforts and influencing voters to keep them in office than they are in engaging in conflict resolution and moving forward in mitigating the effects of climate change.



The Lost Girls of Paris

omable decision to leave her daughter and serve as an SOE agent in the perilous months leading up to D-Day.

The book also tells the story of Eleanor Trigg, the SOE officer in charge of the female agents, who embarks after the war on a desperate quest to learn the fates of the women

who never came home. Finally, we have the perspective of Grace Healey, a widow living in New York City in 1946 who finds an abandoned suitcase containing photos of twelve women and embarks on a quest to find out the truth about them.

In April we read and discussed the book *The Lost Girls of Paris* by Pam Jenoff. It is inspired by the real-life story of the women who courageously deployed into occupied Europe for Britain's Special Operations Executive (SOE) to wage covert war on the Germans. These nearly forty women bravely fought alongside men as radio operators, couriers, and saboteurs. And (no spoilers here!) after a series of unlikely betrayals, many of them disappeared and were never heard from again.

The Lost Girls of Paris is told from the points of view of three women. First, Marie Roux, a young single mother who makes the unfath-

Our group unanimously agreed that they enjoyed the book, but were not overly impressed by the writing. It was okay writing, but nothing spectacular about it. A few of the events seemed contrived and not quite believable. We did, however, enjoy the story and learning about this historical part of WWII.
