

Spotlight on Cindy Harp

Cindy has been co-chair of the Mariposa AAUW board for three years and we have been privileged to have her in leadership. Cindy has a calm, guiding voice that will be sorely missed as she steps down from that position this month. So it seems appropriate to highlight her as she steps back to give others the chance to experience the fulfillment of team leadership.



Cindy was born in Fort Wayne, Indiana, and lived in that vicinity through high school. Her family moved around a lot and for a while landed in a rural area where she attended an Amish school. Some of her fondest memories from her school years revolve around the generosity and great humor of her Amish schoolmates.

Cindy went on to Purdue University at a regional campus in Fort Wayne. She started as an English major but happened upon a college drama school production of “No Exit” by Jean-Paul Sartre. Cindy describes that play as an earth-shattering experience, prompting her to change her major to theater, and she never looked back. She describes spending some university at the main campus in West Lafayette where their theater department brought New York City actors to work with students in regional theater.

After college, Cindy took a “straight job” at a supermarket to save money for a while, then

took a job at Summer Stock in State College Pennsylvania, at Penn State. Later she went to New York City to experience the “big city” life. She worked in the travel industry putting together European tours for about a year. She went to New York with a half dozen friends and delighted in the nightlife. She also remembers being in a West Village park for

the first-ever Earth Day.

A technical director in Baltimore offered Cindy a stage manager position for a touring regional theater company and she jumped at the chance to be involved in theater again. They did shows for high schools, prisons, and even Spiro Agnew. After two years on the road, working almost every day, Cindy was pretty worn out so she went back to Indiana to rest, work, and save money. She worked in civic theater and took a day job with North American Van Lines.

It was about this time that Cindy met Lynn at a live music spot she was dragged to by a friend. The two ladies were waiting to get in, as were Lynn and another young man. The maître d’ came out and said they had a table for four, so the two pairs of friends looked at each other and decided, “Why not?” Cindy’s first official date with Lynn was church and breakfast. Two years later they married and started a nomad existence traveling west and seeing the country. For a while, they landed in Flagstaff

writing for the education division of McGraw Hill publishers. She worked there for 25 years.







pandemic, the murder of George Floyd, and more, with humor through a Native lens. Erdrich also wrote the highly-acclaimed **The Night Watchman**.


A precious gem, The Journey of my Shaping by Devona Boone is another good read.

This month our Great Decisions group met at Becky Mott's home. Our discussion centered on Myanmar and the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN). We watched a video made by the Foreign Policy Association. Its subtitle, "Myanmar's Never-Ending Crisis," pretty much sums up the situation. After gaining independence from Great Britain in 1948, Myanmar was subject to ethnic violence, a military takeover, a brief interlude with democracy, and a military coup in February 2021.

For generations, the country had been known as "Burma," named after the dominant Burman ethnic group. Since 1989 however, its name was officially changed to

the Republic of Myanmar. "Myanmar" was an old name for part of Burma and was selected by the military leaders to "cast off a relic of colonialism and/or to downplay the connection to the Burman ethnic majority."

ASEAN has barred Myanmar's junta from its meetings. It is interesting to note that Russia continues to pledge more arms to its military and Myanmar fully backed Russia in its invasion of Ukraine.





Great Circle is the story of two women spanning time from 1914 to the present. One is a pilot/adventurer (1914) and the other is a famous Hollywood actress (present). They never meet, but their stories are connected. The story of the pilot, Marian Graves, is akin to Amelia Earhart, whose ultimate quest is to fly the polar circumference of the world. The adventures she has getting to this quest takes up most of the 590 pages of the book.

Our group decided that the author wrote wonderfully poetic prose but took many divergent paths to ultimately finish the plot. She herself admitted, "...Imagine my surprise, then, when I got a few pages into writing the book and decided that, no, I should start with an ocean liner

being launched in Glasgow in 1909... This was pretty much how writing the whole book went. I thought I knew what I was doing, and then some other idea would appear and I'd have to change course..." Her characters were developed to the last detail (almost to excess!), making them very believable and real. Nonetheless, it was an enjoyable read.

“Clearances” help bring Scotland into more modern times

The International Study Group met at the home of Jill Rowney on May 24th. Christina Oborn took us through Scotland during the 18th and 19th centuries. Then the land owners were having more and more difficulty making ends meet. Needing more capital than farming earned, they turned to “clearing” the land of people so they would have room to raise sheep. The Clearances was essentially the

forced eviction of the inhabitants of the Highlands. The eviction of tenants went against *dùthchas*, the principle that clan members had an inalienable right to rent land in the clan territory. This was never recognized in Scottish law. It was gradually abandoned by clan chiefs as they began to think of themselves simply as commercial landlords, rather than as patriarchs of their people.
