Project: Gov Trek

Exciting new project needs volunteers

AAUW California is starting a new program called Gov Trek. As the name suggests, this program will provide high school junior and senior girls with the opportunity to hear about careers in government and public service from panelists who are current officeholders, staff, and campaign leaders. While women have made significant gains since the first "Year of the Woman" thirty years ago, we are still nowhere near being at parity with men. The goal of this program is to expose the next generation to opportunities in leadership in an effort to further close that gender gap. Best of all, this program is free to students and AAUW branches. Leadership member, Kim Monson, is contacting Mariposa County High School and Sierra Home School to promote this opportunity.

The program will be entirely online over five two-hour sessions starting January 28th. The first two sessions will have them learn from the panelists. The next two sessions will have them working in groups with an adult facilitator to complete activities such as writing speeches or designing political messages. In the last session, students will work in teams of six to create a realistic campaign simulation that will be evaluated by VIP industry judges with awards in several categories.

This wonderful program will only be possible if there are volunteers to facilitate the breakout rooms. Breakout room facilitators will manage a group of up to 15 students via Zoom. Facilitators will help them stay on task, assist with the understanding and implementation of assigned activities, and facilitate collaboration among the group for active participation. It is likely that the groups will be mostly self-directed. There will be a Zoom volunteer training in early January. 12 volunteers are needed for each of the January 28 and February 11 sessions and 25 volunteers are needed for each of the February 25 and March 11 sessions. You may volunteer to facilitate any of the sessions for which you are available. You **do not have to do** them all.


Jody Sergienko recommends "Island of the Sea



Holmes Mystery series in 2006. The books were so popular that two movies were made. Enola

follows in the footsteps of her famous brother and becomes a super sleuth in her own right.

Peggy Shainberg recommends *The Thursday Murder Club*, a novel by Richard Osman. In a peaceful retirement community in England, four senior citizens meet once a week to look at cold cases and see if they can solve them. When a murder happens,



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the quartet of septuagenarians find themselves trying to solve this case. The characters are quirky and very entertaining. There are two additional books featuring these characters.

Trish Darcy watched "*Maid*", a drama series on Netflix. It is the story of Alex, a single mother

who turns to cleaning houses as a way to make ends meet, as she leaves an abusive relationship. Her focus is on making a better life for her daughter as she overcomes homelessness and dealing with the bureaucracy of government agencies as she



tries to get help. The title character is played by Margaret Qualley, and her mother is played by Andie McDowell, who is her mother in real life. As you watch, you will see Alex encounter many obstacles, but she continues to persevere. The series has ten episodes.

Spotlight on Jill Harry

Most of us know Jill Harry from her various school and community volunteer efforts. Want something done? Just ask Jill and, poof! It happens! I'd like to tell you more about her.



Jill was born in St. Louis, Missouri and lived there until she left for college. She attended the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor and earned a degree in English. Following college, Jill was curious to experience the Bay Area so she joined a group of college friends who had moved there. Over the next 10 years, Jill lived in several neighborhoods in Oakland and San Francisco. She used her degree to get an entry-level job in publishing. Then, as is so common in the industrial world, she accepted jobs at other publishing companies every couple of years to move up in the industry, earning raises and promotions. Somewhere along the way, Jill met Jon, moved to LA (San Pedro), married Jon, and had two kids.

Jill and her family moved to Catheys Valley in 2003 for Jon's job. When her third child was born, it was time to quit publishing. But did she really quit? Jill? No. She found tons of volunteer work that could be done on her own schedule. At the time, there were no preschools in Catheys Valley, so Jill and her friends got to work and created one. In the process, Jill became a "First -Kim Monson

5" commissioner. When her oldest child started at Catheys Valley Elementary, Jill joined and was active in the Parent Teacher Improvement Club (PTIC). When that school was closed, Jill and her friends became activists again, working to create Sierra Foothill

Charter School. Usually, it takes a couple of years to get a charter school started. Jill's group was so effective, they got it done in a year. When her oldest was in eighth grade, Jill joined the MCHS Academic Boosters Club supporting the high school. She has been president of that organization for the past six years. When her youngest son graduates from MCHS in June, Jill will be ready to give up that position and move on.

Responding to the Oak Fire disaster, Jill was hired as one of the twelve Fire Case Managers at the Alliance for Community Transformations, helping the 204 families impacted by the fire, many of whom lost their homes. It's a temporary job and when it's over, what will she do next? Well, Jill is finally ready to take time for herself. She and Jon plan to increase their travel, starting with trips to Panama and Alaska. She'll also have more time for hiking and taking photos. When I asked Jill what her family might say was unusual about her, Jill thinks they would say she volunteers too much. I'd say our community is all the better for it. Thank you, Jill!





Kristen Miller. We all decided that the title was not the best for the book and was a bit misleading.

Guided by voices only Nessa can hear, the trio of women discover a body of a teenage girl abandoned beside a remote beach. The police had written the victim off as a drugaddicted sex worker, but the women refused to buy into that official narrative. Their investigation into the girl's murder led to finding more bodies, and to the town's most exclusive and isolated enclave, a world of stupendous wealth where the rules don't apply. With their newfound powers, Jo, ers. None of us felt there was a whole lot to the book until we started discussing it and found that the deeper we dug, the more interesting ideas we found. One of the more interesting ideas to me was that these three women were working to protect (in their own way, whether it be legal or illegal), "girls that the world felt it was okay to forget." This seems to point to current events such as the Jeffery Epstein case and missing and exploited indigenous women. We think the author was trying purposefully to bring these issues to light.

It was a fun read and we recommend you try it out!
