Climate change and dealing with its resulting effects

The Great Decisions article for this month's meeting was entitled *Climate change*, *environmental degradation*, *and migration*. Several of our members had unexpected personal issues that prevented them from attending, which limited our ability to have a lively discussion.

I thought the article was interesting and pointed out many complex issues that have arisen. One surprising fact of note is that the first climate change migration in the United States is on the coast of Louisiana, on the island of Jean Charles. The island is suffering from rising sea levels and damage from Hurricane Ida in 2021. It is very likely that we Americans will encounter all the same problems of internal crises and displacement as we currently have with migration from elsewhere. (An example is the Dust Bowl era. The people migrating from the Midwest were

greatly resented by the local people in California).

With the political divide within our country, it is difficult for us to help other countries find means of coping with the issues of crises we all routinely face, much less looking at preparing for or preventing issues that will come 40 years in the future.

A discussion yet to be had is what we can learn about supporting the fertility of our own land and how to adjust our growing practices to use less water while growing more food; how to hold water in the soil. The program video touched on this, but nothing really focused on what we as landowners can do to adjust to our changing circumstances.

The subtitle for this *Dinners With Ruth*, "A Memoir on the Power of

Friendships," is a far more accurate title for this lovely compilation of anecdotes. If one expected to learn a great deal about Ruth Bader Ginsberg's life and personal interactions, one might be a little disappointed. In our book discussion, we decided that the selection of this particular title was more of a selling point. A typical reaction from the group was, "If this was advertised as a

memoir of Nina Totenberg, I wouldn't have read it."

That being said, we did find the book an enjoyable read, with personal anecdotes about many well-known figures from NPR and Washington D.C.

This compilation does not read chronologically, so we're a little confused when in one chapter, her husband, Frank, becomes ill and dies and in the next chapter he is alive and well.

Nina's style is very relaxed and easy to read. There is an overall gentle quality to her stories, depicting how important friends are and how fragile life can be.

Twenty-four years of research

(or "Examining the appetites of the mule deer")

OK, so what do deer not eat? Well, meat and dairy for sure they don't eat... not sure about chocolate and sugary drinks, and probably not coffee drinks.... or alcohol. So, what is left? I always swore they decimated anything green and leafy. However, I have been studying the little devils around the house and after some 24 years of observation and experimentation, have come to some conclusions:

- 1. They will eat anything that grows if they are hungry enough... even iris in the fall.
- 2. They don't particularly like native shrubs to the point of killing them. They will browse in the spring and summer heavily but that just saves you time from having to prune.
- 3. They do eat weeds!
- 4. Keep anything you want to eat yourself behind an 8' fence or in a green house.
- 5. They appear to be interested in climbing the stairs to the upper deck just to see if there anything green and leafy.

So, if you want some flowers, what are some of your options? Here are some plants that have worked in my garden:

 Buckwheat, all sorts, especially the yellow flowering kind, and yes, the deer just walk right by them while in full bloom.



 Salvia, Cleveland sage, blue eyed grass, rosemary, oregano, native grasses, santolina, lavender, lilac, iris, rockrose, mock orange, cotoneaster, native lupine and poppies (collect seeds from the plants that grow along the roads and just throw them around your yard). Not only will the deer not kill these plants, but the bees will love you for it.

As for gophers and ground squirrels? Don't get me started on those children of Satan!

Editor's note: My lilac bushes have been systematically pruned up to about 5 feet. I guess the deer down here at my elevation (1700') have a more robust appetite. I would add to the list of plants the deer are likely to ignore: creeping thyme, humming bird sage, and lychness.
