

**Demon Copperhead** by


Barbara Kingsolver is a story told by Demon Fields, first named Demon by his classmates and later named Copperhead for his red hair. The novel follows the storyline of *David Copperfield* 

and is termed a Bildungsroman, which is defined as a novel dealing with one person's formative years or spiritual education. In this case, the protagonist had a very rough journey from being a child to becoming an adult. Demon is an engaging and likeable narrator who weaves a good deal of humor in describing situations. This is good, as his story goes from one catastrophe to another, with very few bits of good times. Demon's charm, and Kingsolver's skilled writing makes one want to continue reading to see what happens next. Barbara Kingsolver is a prolific and well-reviewed writer who has authored over twelve bestselling novels. This novel won the 2023 Pulitzer Prize for fiction.

Elizabeth Strout's 2022 novel, *Lucy by the* 

**Sea**, is the story of Lucy Barton, a successful author in her 60s who is divorced from her philandering first husband with whom she shares two daughters. She married again and lived in New York City with her second husband who played in an orchestra. He

passed away, leaving Lucy a widow. At the beginning of the pandemic her ex- husband, William, convinces her to come to a small town in Maine. She anticipates that it will be a short visit, but then stays with him for over a



year. Even as the pandemic continues, Lucy comes to terms with her evolving relationship with William while adjusting to life as a widow, combined with seeing their daughters and making new friends and acquaintances in her new life in Maine. Jill says that this is a charming read/listen. This book has been very well reviewed by many sources, with one reviewer calling it "One of the best books of the year!"

In her 2020 novel, *A Thousand Ships*, author Natalie Haynes tells stories of the Trojan War from the perspective of the women usually

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

seen in only supportive roles in Homer's *Iliad and Odys*sey and other novels. Most of the women's lives end in rather unpleasant ways, but few would have you feel sorry for them. Haynes gives

them depth, strength, and courage to get through what the gods have in store for them. One reviewer wrote that the author's extensive knowledge of Greek mythology shines through her skillful storytelling. Jill concurs with that opinion. Haynes narrates the audio version and has a great voice for it. This novel was on the shortlist for the 2020 Women's Prize for Fiction.

Jill also gave me excellent recommendations for podcasts, tv, and movies. Thank you, Jill! These will be featured in next month's

# **Food from the Baltic Region**

To finish our exploration of Finland and Estonia, the International Study Group met at Jill Rowney's home for a wonderful array of traditional foods of those countries. Those included a delicious Finnish pea soup (hernekeitto) and a wonderful Estonian potato salad (kartulisalat) which, though being traditional foods of the two countries, were very similar to the traditional standard soup and salad we appreciate here in America. Less familiar were foods like Estonian Kohupiimakreem, a simple cheese/cream dessert with fresh fruit.

Marti Fazio treated us to the Finnish "Long Drink" (*lonkero*), coined as the "best canned cocktail in the world." It is traditionally made



from gin and grapefruit juice, but now comes in many fruit flavors. It was originally introduced in 1952 when the Olympic Games were held in Helsinki. Finland was still recovering from the effects of World War II and the Finnish

government wanted to create something that was quick to make and had "easy-drinking" appeal. They invented this drink to help bartenders deal with the influx of tourists and spectators. It was a definite "hit!"

# Dead Ringer was a "doppelganger"

A small but mighty group of play readers gathered to read *Dead Ringer*, a 1983 British maybe-comedy-maybe-drama-maybe-thriller written by Charles Ross. It wasn't Pulitzer Prize-worthy, but we enjoyed the clever plot. The Prime Minister dropped dead from an apparent heart attack on the eve of the General Election and two cabinet members who feared they needed his charisma to get reelected, hired an out-of-work lookalike actor to replace the de-

ceased. The dead ringer was supposed to fill in until after the election was won, but he grew to like the role. . . until he discovered that the real PM was poisoned. At that point, the characters become suspects and, as expected, secrets are revealed. I'm not sure we'd call it a comedy or a drama or a thriller, but at least *Dead Ringer* was not a deadly read. And writing this review gave me a chance to finally use the delightful word "doppelganger!"



# The Story of Beautiful Girl

By Rachel Simon

Our June discussion for the Book Group was *The Story of Beautiful* 

Girl by Rachel Simon. We all agreed it was a wonderful story to read. It discussed the "schools" where children were put to live who had disabilities of some sort. Families who had children that somehow would not "fit in" during the last half of the 1800s and first half of the 1900s would send them away. These places did not have a reputation for caring for children well.

The story begins in 1968 when Lynnie, a young white woman with a developmental disability, and Homan, an African American



deaf man, are locked away in an institution, the School for the Incurable and Feebleminded, and have been left to languish, forgotten. Lynnie and Honan escape the school and head off on their own. She is pregnant. The baby is born one rainy night and they end up

leaving her with Martha, a retired school-teacher, and running from the authorities. Lynnie ends up back at the school and Homan is on the run. The book follows his adventures, Lynnie's time at the facility until its closure, and the child's growing up with Martha. We won't give away the ending, but suffice it to say, we all liked it.

The story allowed us to have a discussion about these schools. We were shocked to learn how many there actually were and that California still has 10 such facilities. These, of course, are run much better than the one in the story. We also discussed children with special needs and the ways in which we provide for them in schools now. We all highly recommend this for someone looking for a great story!
