
Kathy was born and raised on a farm in the middle of Iowa about 60 miles north of Des Moines. They raised corn and soybeans. Kathy was number six out of ten kids. Oh, my goodness, I can't even imagine being pregnant 10 times. Her poor mom! Anyway, Kathy remembers fondly that everyone had a job; everyone was part of a team. Her summers were spent walking along the rows of plants pulling weeds to be sure that the machines only harvested corn or soybeans. It was tough work, but it was satisfying. Kathy feels fortunate to have been born in the middle of the pack. She had older siblings to show her the way and younger siblings who gave her the satisfaction of passing it on. The farm is still in the family and Kathy and Glen go back roughly

five times a year to visit.

All of Kathy's siblings went to college and she feels grateful to the older siblings for breaking the parents into all sorts of ideas. By the time Kathy was ready to attend the University of Iowa, it was just assumed that she would go. She majored in history and social work and worked for a time as a social worker. She also met Glen in college and when he finished his master's degree in accounting, he got a job offer from one of the "Big 3" accounting firms. That job brought them to the Bay Area where they lived for eight years.

In 1982 Glen was offered the chief financial officer position by Yosemite Bank which prompted their move to Mariposa. Kathy and Glen love Yosemite National Park and country life and appreciate the opportunity to have been able to raise their three children here. Their kids, Sarah, Julie, and Andrew, are all currently in their 40's with kids of their own.

Surprisingly, Kathy started a midlife career as a flight attendant. She says there were places in the world she wanted to visit, and a

Our members share what we have found enlightening and entertaining




For a great activity, Jody Sergienko recommends Sierra Art Trails, being held over two weekends, September 29 to October 1 and October 6 to October 8. Catalogs which serve as your ticket cost \$20 and cover admission for two adults to all tour locations and directions to each locale. Catalogs may be purchased online or in Mariposa at the Visitors Center, Chocolate Soup, or Casto Oaks. (Spoiler alert—Veronica Gross has opened her studio!) Jody also recommends *The Paris Murders* on Amazon. It is the story of Chloe Saint-Laurent who is a profiler and works with a police team to

solve murders in Paris. It is in French with subtitles.

Another suggestion is **Asteroid City** on Amazon, Peacock, and other streaming services. This movie follows the author of a world-famous fictional play about a grieving father who travels with his tech obsessed



family to rural Asteroid City to compete in a junior stargazing event, only to have his view of the world disrupted forever.

On Netflix, *Virgin River* is a series about life in a small, idyllic community that focuses on the lives of the people who

Nurse on Netflix. It is a true story of a nurse named Charles Cullen, a real life serial killer who is believed to have killed nearly 400 people during his 16-year career as a nurse. The performances by Jessica Chastain and Eddie Redmayne are very power-

ful. There is also a companion piece on Netflix that is a documentary about the actual events and the woman who helped expose Cullen. The movie follows the actual events very closely.


