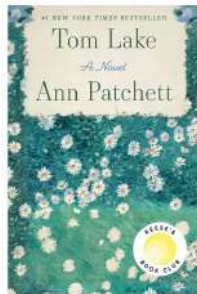

Happy December everyone! I'm taking over Member Corner this month with some of my own recommendations and some that friends have told me about.

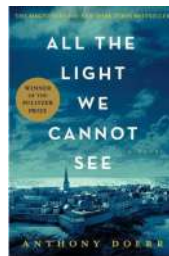
Tom Lake by Ann Patchett is a story about multi-generations, love, memories and summer stock theater. A mother relates her experiences about her acting career in her younger life and her relationship with a man who would later become a famous actor. Her three daughters were very curious about her past, and had conflicting responses to her stories. This is a beautifully written novel that goes back and forth in time as the mother shares her memories.



The Couple Next Door by Shari Lapena. This novel is about a young couple, their baby, mysterious neighbors, and a kidnapping. It is definitely a page turner! It is

being made into a movie and should be out sometime in 2024.

Body Surfing by Anita Shreve is about a 29-year-old woman who has been both divorced and widowed. As she tries to rebuild her life, she takes a job as a tutor to a teenage girl and lives with the wealthy family in a seaside home. 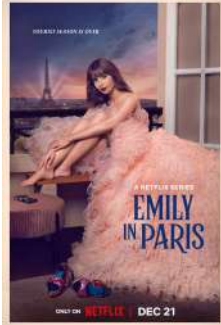

West With Giraffes

We had a great discussion of Lynda Rutledge's *West with Giraffes*, the can't-put-it-down, true story of two giraffes bound for San Diego Zoo in 1938. Why write a book about that? Because truth is stranger than fiction. After weeks on a ship from Africa, the giraffes were nearly lost in the hurricane that devastated New York Harbor that year. They were fished out of the wrecked ship and transported across the country for 12 days in a jerry-rigged pickup truck. Every disaster possible befell them, from floods to theft to low tunnels. Depression-weary Americans followed their journey in the daily news and found hope in the miraculous event.



We loved the authenticity of the characters (some real and some fictional). They were fascinating and

flawed: the curmudgeonly "Old Man" with a past, the young rowdy "Woody" with an unknown future, a young female photographer with a secret, the world's first female zoo director, kind strangers, and assorted reprobates as spotty as the giraffes.

We felt the story was remarkable and very well-written with delightful and realistic language. It had many layers beyond the bumpy road trip itself. It dealt with how desperate times make people do desperate things, the treatment of Blacks and women, the angst of coming of age, first love, and more.
