

News from AAUW California Public Policy Committee

A Successful 2024 Legislative Agenda

2024 has been an exciting year for AAUW California's Legislative Agenda. There were many excellent bills that were introduced in the legislature early in the year. The Public Policy Committee evaluated over 60 of these bills that were most closely aligned with our Public Policy Priorities. Our committee met virtually over a weekend in March to discuss and vote on the best bills to include in our 2024 Legislative Agenda, prioritizing them into A, B, C, and Watch categories. We selected 41 bills for our Legislative Agenda, not including the Watch bills, and from March through September we worked to educate about and advocate for these bills.

Thanks to the many AAUW members who participated in Lobby Days, to those who called or wrote to their legislators and the Governor through our Action Alert Network, and thanks in no small part to the tireless efforts of Kathy Van Osten, our Legislative Advocate, 29 of the 41 bills on our Legislative Agenda made it to

the Governor's desk, and 25 of them have been signed into law!

Excitingly, all three of our A priority bills were signed by the Governor:

- Our signature bill AB 2843 was authored and sponsored by AAUW California. The bill eliminates cost sharing, including deductibles, from being imposed on any rape survivor seeking medical care following a rape. The bill was inspired when Kathi Harper, Public Policy Director, read an OpEd piece in the Los Angeles Times by Dr. Samuel Dickman, Chief Medical Officer at Planned Parenthood of Montana, describing the plight of countless rape survivors who do not seek medical care following their assault because of prohibitive costs. AB 2843 removes the cost barrier, ensuring that survivors can receive the care they need following a traumatic sexual attack.
- AB 2326, also sponsored by AAUW California, requires the Chancellors of the Community Colleges and the State Universities, and the President of the University of California, to provide an annual report of their schools' compliance with Title IX.

The report will be publicly, orally presented to the Senate and Assembly Budget Subcommittees on Education Finance.

 AB 2099 makes it possible for the District Attorney to pursue felony charges for the posting of information about reproductive health care patients or providers if the posting and subsequent actions result in bodily injury.

Two of our B priority bills were signed into law:

- AB 1790 requires the CSU system to report on the implementation of recommendations provided in the California State Auditor report, to ensure Title IX compliance and protections against sexual harassment.
- AB 1831 expands the law prohibiting the possession and distribution of material depicting minors performing sexual activ-

ities to include AI and computergenerated images.

And very significantly, AB 1955 was signed into law. This was a C priority bill only because it was added to our Legislative Agenda later in the process.

 AB 1955 prohibits public schools from notifying parents if their child uses a different name or pronouns or identifies as a different gender than assigned at birth.

California is the first state in the nation to ban forced outing of transgender students.

We are back after a little break! I would like to thank Jill Harry who is such a great contributor to this column. With that said, let's get started!

Anita de Monte Laughs Last,

written by Xochitl Gonzalez, is based on the true story of Ana Mendieta, a Cuban painter, performance artist, and sculptor. She married Carl Andre, a well-known



minimalist sculptor. In 1985, he threw her out the 34th story window of her Greenwich Village apartment. Carl was arrested and went to trial three years later and was acquitted. (Jill has an artist friend who lived in New York at the time, witnessed the uproar, and had no doubt that Carl was guilty). Gonzalez's book is a well-imagined telling of the story through the fictionalized characters of Anita and Jack. Anita's story is interspersed with the story of Raquel, a thirdyear art history student at an Ivy League university who is preparing her final thesis. Raquel is a minority at her school, surrounded by privileged students and feels like an outsider. When she begins a relationship

with a well-connected older art student, things change for her. At first she thinks the relationship is great, but soon finds it uncomfortable. She then hears about Anita de Monte, and in researching her, she makes some discoveries about herself.

Jill said that this book is very well-written and entertaining. It was selected to be a pick of the Reese Witherspoon Book Club.

Jill also recommends the new Netflix series **Kaos** starring Jeff Goldblum. The Greek Gods



are a rich and powerful modernday family. They are led by Zeus (Goldblum), who lives on Mount Olympus with his

wife, Hera. Zeus is impulsive and deeply insecure. There is a plan to overthrow Zeus that depends on a slew of gods, demigods and mortals working together, whether or not they are aware of the roles they each are playing.



We Provide Opportunities for Women to Reach Full Potential



I just finished a novel that profoundly moved me, recommended by many friends and AAUW members. *The Women*, written by

Kristin Hannah, tells the story of Frankie McGrath, a young woman in 1965 who impulsively decides to join the Army Nurse Corps, to follow her brother who was sent to



Vietnam. Frankie is naïve and inexperienced and has no idea of the horrors she will face as a surgical nurse in Vietnam. The descriptions of her work with the constant flow of injured and dying soldiers are overwhelming. Through it all, she bonds with two other nurses as they support one another. When Frankie returns home, the aftermath of war haunts her, and she has trouble assimilating

back into the life she once led. The fact that no one seemed to think that women had any role in the Vietnam conflict didn't help at all.

This is a book that I continue to think about. As a high school and college student in the late sixties/early seventies, Vietnam was a constant presence in our lives. Some supported the war, others did not. The news media did not always report the truth. Friends of mine went to fight for our country. Others were nervous that their draft number would be called. My boyfriend, now husband, enlisted and became a navy medic. His unit was next to be sent to Vietnam, but fortunately, they were not needed. As the war escalated, so did the protests. Activist Jane Fonda spoke at my college. The way the Vietnam veterans were greeted as they returned from war was shameful. It was a sad chapter in our history.

The Corks and Forks Wine group meets monthly to experience different types of wines and enjoy them with appetizers and meals paired to complement the varietal being tasted.







On September 8, 1900, a devastating hurricane hit Galveston, Texas, resulting in a loss of between 6,000 and 12,000 lives. For November, the SIG book group read Erik Larsen's account in *Isaac's Storm* (remember *The Devil in the White City*?). In his meticulous fashion, Larsen goes into immense detail chronicling



the development of the storm and the actions of Isaac Cline, local meteorologist for the National Weather Service. In his typical style, Larsen researched personal diaries, newspapers, and weather service reports. An air of

hubris permeated the weather service, which was exemplified by Cline's actions. How could they be so wrong about predicting the deadliest hurricane in our history? Thanks to Jaye Howes for hosting the group.
