What is this new program: "Lunch with Leaders?"

Since UC Merced is no longer planning to host the "Dinner with a Scientist," we brought up the idea of a new program to replace it at the annual meeting last June. Many people were interested in the idea of a lunch with women who are in leadership roles in our community. We got a committee together and have met a few times to get this new program up and running.

The program is meant to allow high school girls the opportunity to meet and interact with women who may inspire them and provide them the opportunity to come away with the conviction that they could do whatever they want to do. Women are underrepresented in leadership roles and we would like to support girls who wish pursue one. We are focusing on the idea of leadership skills and what makes a good leader as opposed to a "career day" type of event.

The format is modeled after "Dinner with a Scientist" in that the girls will be seated around a table in small groups with a woman leader at each table. The girls will have the opportunity to move from table to table to allow them to interact with all of the speakers.

We will be providing lunch, drinks, and dessert for the girls and speakers that day. This will be the part where we will need you, our members, to assist. We will be sending information out next month letting you know what you

She demonstrated the methods, covered safety issues for performing these techniques, and allowed time for lots of practice. The practice part was well-received by the attendees and it was decided that more of this

In addition to Kim's presentation, we had the (only) two female deputies in our Sheriff's Department come to speak and answer questions. Amber Rodriguez and Alicia Petretti gave us tips on how to keep ourselves safe. Among those ideas were that we need to always be aware of our surroundings, lock the car and the house, even if we are in our safe town of Mariposa, and always have a plan. They allowed for questions and we learned even more from their responses to the guestions.



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Spotlight on Mary Jensen

One of our newer AAUW members is Mary Jensen.

She was born in Des Moines, Iowa, but remembers nothing about it. Her father, having served in the Navy and been stationed in California, swore he would live there one day. Well, that day happened when the family moved to Danville (in the East Bay) when Mary was barely a toddler. When her parents split up, Dad

moved to San Mateo and Mary, her two siblings, and her mom moved in with Mom's second husband in Calaveras County. That is when Mary developed her love for horses.

Now Calaveras is not known for its excellent schools, so at the age of 14, Mary moved in with Dad and attended San Mateo High School. She went on to study liberal arts at the College of San Mateo, then earned a BS in behavioral science at Notre Dame de Namur. This Notre Dame is a small private college in the San Mateo area. Mary said she grabbed the behavioral science major because it was the quickest degree she could get, as she was getting quite tired of school. She must have done well in her efforts, however, because she was given a Regents' Scholarship to help her finish.

Mary went to work for a company that shipped agriculture commodities overseas and said it was an education all over again. She learned about finance and especially about maritime law. The



company was bought out by Con Agra, which wasn't as fun. She did manage a small group of people tasked with shipping documentation. After six years, Mary had had enough of the "big company attitude." So she left for another learning experience (job).

A friend of hers owned a printing brokerage. He was working by himself and needed help so Mary went into the publishing business. They took in

books, catalogs, posters, and worked with the creators to get these materials ready with typesetting, graphics, organization, and then sent them overseas to be printed. Along the way, she received a certificate in web/graphic design from UC Berkeley. Mary really enjoyed the creative aspects of the job as well as working with the clients.

Unfortunately, Mary contracted breast cancer, followed by two other bouts of cancer and had to retire. Her new job was just to survive. Along the way, she was able to accompany her husband, a telecommunications engineer, to Chicago, Rome, Bahamas, and Florida as he followed his career path.

Mary has two children and many grandchildren. Her son, Jesse, lives here in Mariposa with his wife and children. Mary's daughter, who served our country as a Marine, now lives in Michigan where she is a paralegal working for the Red Cross.


The Murder of Roger Ackroyd

The Book SIG decided to choose a mystery by a known author. Too many books, too little time. So we chose two books: *The Grey Wolf* by Louise Penny and *The Murder of Roger Ackroyd* by Agatha

Christie. Penny continues her series (this is her 19th) with a story featuring the sleuth, Chief Inspector Gamache. Centered around a threat of ecoterrorism on a major Canadian metropolis, the Inspector and his team travel to Montreal, Ottawa, Washington, D.C., the Vatican, Paris, and his home of Three Pines, as well as a remote monastery on the Canadian coast. If you know the Inspector and his team, the names will be familiar. The book moves quickly through a web of interconnected individuals to eliminate the threat.



In *The Murder of Roger Ackroyd*, Agatha Christie

continues to follow the exploits of Hercule Poirot, the Belgian detective with a penchant for detail. Not one to jump to conclusions (as others in the book do), he meticulously interrogates anyone with any contact with the deceased in addition to viewing all of the physical evidence to come to his logical decision which reveals a dramatic twist.

The play was an agreeable read with a few surprises. It was made better by the readers being able to keep the same parts throughout. Sometimes the number of readers and characters works out; sometimes it doesn't and we end up rotating a lot or reading multiple parts. Oh, the predicaments of great theater!

But, surprisingly, the play was a clever look at how a traditional housewife could be anything but traditional. Faced with a philandering husband, the aptly-named heroine, Constance, appeared to cooly accept her fate and remain resigned to a marriage of pretense. Her situation could have been desperate in those days. But she was not. She found a clever way to turn the tables and maintain her marriage and dignity on her own terms. Considering the play's era, her solution was quite "modern."

We found the play very readable, with some food for thought. Even today.
